





# Ratie

Katie Brown texted "Look for the big red chicken," when sending directions to the 19th-century Colonial she shares with her family. While traveling along a country lane, I easily spotted the scarlet sign marking the entrance to her long driveway and wound my way to the front of the house. As The Jetsons' theme song chimed from the doorbell speaker, the domestic goddess herself answered the door.

Three years ago, Brown, host of PBS's Katie Brown Workshop, was living with her family in Carroll Gardens, Brooklyn, and taping her art-of-living show in nearby Red Hook. Her husband, William Corbin, meanwhile, was commuting to Norwalk. "His commute was pretty brutal. He left before our daughters woke up and got home after they'd gone to bed. We all missed him terribly," she says. "Since I can work from anywhere, I blithely said, 'Let's move to the suburbs."

"To be honest, I was a little nervous shout moving to Connecticut," Brown continues. "I worried that everything would be beige—the houses, the people, the way of life—after all, I'd been living in New York and LA for 20 years." Brown's search in Greenwich, New Canaam, and Silvermine failed to produce her dream homestead where she could taise per family and film her show. "I was looking for a wreck because I love bringing houses back to life."

Eventually, a friend suggested Ridgefield, and Brown discovered that Connecticut wasn't so beige after all. In fact, one of the first things she realized that she liked about Ridgefield was the natural beauty. "As I was driving around looking for a house, I became obsessed with the stone walls. It was literally the grounding that made me stop and say, 'maybe this is going to be okay."

When Brown found her quirky antique house, she fell in love.
"Homes were so gracious in the way they were laid our years ago.
This house kind of unfolds as it rambles. An added advantage was

that without a lot of structural changes, I could really put my stamp on it." At lightning speed, she installed a brand-new kitchen, updated the bathrooms, and applied her signature effectic style to the decor. "Some of my previous homes had more neutral pale ites, but to avoid being too being. I infused a lot of color into this bouse," explains the author of five best-selling books on the domestic arts.


Not unlike her landscape, Brown's adjustment to suburban life was a little rocky. When she and William moved to Ridgefield with daughters Prentiss and Meredith, she was disappointed that no one stopped by with a cherry pie to welcome the family to town. Not missing a beat, the Michigan native realized the Connecticut Yankees might appreciate some midwestern hospitality themselves, and she threw her own "Welcome to the Neighborhood" party.

After three years, the Brown-Corbin family is fully entrenched in Ridgefield life. Prentiss and Meredith are happily enrolled in the local schools; Corbin has a dream commute; and the neighbors just threw a 50th birthday party for Brown.

Back at the homestead, phase two of the renovation is underway.

Architect John Downs is designing an onsite studio for shooting the fourth season of the Katie Brown Workshop, and the house has been gussied up for Thanksgiving by Brown and her design assistants, Liz

Carboni and Liz Ciavarelli. Brown's motto is "Keep It Simple," so she and the Lizes gathered materials from around the property and local retailers to create the charmingly-down-to-earth holiday decorations.

Inside, a wide gallery leads to the living room where Katie discovered an intricately carved mantal under a century of brown paint. She and Ciavarelli glammed up some rocks and pinecones from the yard by spray painting them gold and arranged them on the mantel along with evergreen boughs and gourds from Young's of Ridgefield. A gratitude garland, draped among the glitter and greenery, has been growing in the days leading up to Thanksgiving, with family and guests each adding a link featuring a hand-written message of thanks. Up a few steps, the dining room is ready for guests to arrive. The table, set for eight, features vintage metal trays filled with layers of hay, golden rocks, berries, and dried corn cors. "I was going to build a rock wall on the table as the centerpiece, but my family would have laughed at me," Brown says with her characteristic enthusiasm. "But, I really think the local rocks are Ridgefield's gold, so I used them as inspiration and mixed in other seasonal elements."

Mouth-watering aromas draw us to the spacious eat-in-kitchen where the feast is being prepared. During Brown's catering days, her communal table dinners in Los Angeles were legendary, drawing celebrity guests and creating a busz in national magazines. Eventually, she was offered syndicated shows on Lifetime Television and then



### TRY THIS AT HOME



### Golden Glaze Rock Arrangement

#### MATERIALS

3-4 separate platters Hay Rocks no bigger than a cantaloupe Spray paint Seasonal flowers Pine cones Wheat grass Plastic sheet

- Brush rocks with a stiff brush, getting off any loose dirt or residue to ensure paint will adhere
- Lay down plastic sheet, place in a well ventilated area
- Spray rocks, let dry
- Lay down a base of hay in each tray
- Place rocks randomly in trays
- Fill in with pine cones, wheat grass, and flowers for a pop of color
